The Frayer Model

The Frayer Model is a vocabulary strategy that teaches complex concepts. Students explore attributes and non-attributes of a concept or idea, or what something is and what something is not. By providing both examples and non-examples, students can critically evaluate a concept's attributes to solidify understanding.

How to Use the Frayer Model in the Classroom:

- 1. Define the concept with examples of its attributes.
- 2. Provide examples of non-critical attributes to demonstrate how the concept differs from similar concepts.
- 3. Provide **examples** of the concept itself. Explain how the examples work.
- 4. Provide **non-examples** and explain why/how they classify as non-examples.
- 5. Ask students to determine why they classify as examples or non-examples.
- 6. Ask students for other examples and non-examples. Ask them to explain why they classify as examples or non-examples.
